Kylie shares her knowledge as an educational leader to support participants to understand the importance of Aboriginal Education for all students. Led by policy and best practice, Kylie will share ideas to equip you with knowledge, skills, and confidence to improve educational outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and will discuss how to authentically develop relationships with communities and lead Aboriginal Education in your school.

Through Kylie's narrative, she'll take you on an eye-opening journey of truth-telling, identity, and hope. From facing fears to using your knowledge and opportunity to harness the power of education and your position as a leader of change. Kylie will inspire you to lead with passion and purpose and to do your part to truly make a difference and lead Aboriginal Education in your school.

Our Deadly Science

In remote Australian schools, where Aboriginal Australians and Torres Strait Islanders are the majority of students, access to science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) resources and equipment can be extremely challenging. Most programs that target educational poverty in Indigenous communities focus on literacy, arts, music, and sports, but seldom STEM. The charity DeadlyScience provides science resources, mentoring and training to more than 180 remote and regional schools across Australia with a particular focus on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. Its founder and CEO, Corey Tutt was 16 when a careers counsellor told him he wasn't smart enough to realise his ambition of becoming a zookeeper and should "stick to a trade or you'll probably end up in jail or worse". Now aged 29, before founding DeadlyScience, Corey did become a zookeeper, as well as an alpaca shearer and animal technician. He says his driving motivation in providing STEM resources to remote schools has been 'You can't be what you can't see'. DeadlyScience has provided more than 25,000 culturally appropriate books focused on STEM, as well as telescopes, microscopes, Lego and other equipment to spark student interest. Schools involved with DeadlyScience have reported a 25% increase in engagement in STEM and increased attendance. Corey says the resources allow Indigenous students to see that they come from generations of the first scientists of this country: people who managed the land and used astronomy to predict weather. In this presentation, Corey will share his journey from leaving school after Year 10 to running a charity that inspires hundreds of students nationwide.
